

Jennifer Brelage, 2001-2004


Playing and lettering for four years, Jennifer Brelage's soccer team captured two district championships and a regional runner-up. Her first high school coach, Dena Currie said, "Jennifer is a special, exciting player. Jennifer Brelage's play was the key to victory-she dominated the offensive end of the field. She is a team player and is never satisfied with anything but her best." Jennifer specialized in soccer at Bardstown and also played competitive club soccer winning one state championship with Mockingbird Valley Soccer Club and three with Javanon Soccer Club. Her last high school coach, Martin Bodkin said, "The attention she takes away - every time she gets the ball, there are three or four people around her. She's definitely one of the best high school players I have seen in my time. Opposing teams may not miss Brelage, but Bardstown High will lose one of the best soccer players in Kentucky High School history." Competing at the highest level was a big commitment that required travel on the weekends and practice in Louisville during the week. With limited free time, Jennifer still made school a priority and was named a valedictorian of her graduating class.

Achieving several personal honors at Bardstown, Jennifer finished her career as the All-Time goal scorer in Bardstown boys and girls soccer history, four-time All-District, two-time All-Region and two-time All-State honors while setting several Kentucky High School records. She had 143 career goals- 4th most in state history; and scored 50 goals in 2002, the 4th highest ever at the time in state records. A prolific scorer, Jennifer scored 18 goals in a single match in 2002, a state and national record that still stands today. Until 2006, she held the state record for most consecutive games with multiple goals at eight games- currently 8th on the state record. Jennifer scored at least one goal in 17 consecutive games in 2002 and 2004, still the 9th highest in state high school history.

Given all her accolades in soccer, Jennifer says one her favorite memories of Bardstown High is helping the girls' soccer team win its first two district championships. She greatly appreciates the support from her family and coaches, and her teammates' constant challenge to be the best. Although receiving multiple scholarship offers from universities, Jennifer decided to attend the University of Louisville and focus on her career. Completing her Bachelor Degree of Science in Dental Hygiene in 2008, Jennifer currently lives and works in Louisville.

Joe Logan

Joe Logan, 1963-1966

An “Athlete for All Seasons,” Joe Logan started his four years in high school the same way each year - marching onto the football gridiron for football in the fall – dribbling his way on the basketball court in the winter – sprinting, throwing and hitting in the spring on the track and baseball diamond. He played football, basketball, track and baseball each year for four years in high school generating 15 total letters. He was co-captain for the football and basketball teams his junior and senior years. During his career, the Tigers won 26 game, lost 8 and tied 1. Joe was chosen as All-Mid KY Conference Fullback and as Courier Journal Honorable Mention All-State Back in 1965.

On the basketball court, Joe was a tenacious defender who harassed the opposing players.

Although not the tallest player, Joe played center for the Tigers. As co-captain and a great defender, he often drew the opposing team’s best player – a role he truly loved. His Tiger team was Mid-KY Conference Champions. As a right fielder on the baseball team, Joe saw plenty of action as his team fought for conference and post season accolades.

Joe was a great sprinter in track helping the Tigers to a Regional Championship his senior year. He was a member of the regional champion 880 yard and mile relay teams. His 880 yard relay team won the Mid-KY Conference championship in 1965 and 1966. In 1965, his mile relay team was also named the Mid-KY Conference Champions. At the 1966 State Track Championship, his mile relay team took third place making Joe and his relay teammates Second-Team All-State and the eighth fastest time for Bardstown team in yards. His 880 yard relay team placed second giving Joe and his teammates First-Team All-State honors in that event - holding a tie for the second fastest 880 yard relay for Bardstown.

After high school Joe heard from Uncle Sam in a draft notice. He experienced military training at Fort Knox and then artillery training at Fort Sill in Oklahoma. After completing his training, Joe served in the Vietnam War where he was injured by mortar shrapnel and received the Purple Heart of Valor. Once Joe returned home he worked at General Electric in Louisville until the strike. Later he started a career with Lily Tulip in Bardstown and retired years later.

Joe fondly remembers his teammates and recalls Coach Garnis Martin as being a strong principled person with high expectations. He has remained an avid Tiger fan over the years. Today, you can find Joe roaming the sidelines of the football field, track, diamond and court challenging young players to demonstrate the same Tiger Spirit he possessed as a student-athlete.

Paul Mattingly

A versatile athlete, Paul Mattingly was a three-year letterman in football, basketball, baseball and four-year letterman in track and field. During his senior year, Paul was the Captain of the football team and a 1,000 yard rusher at halfback and punt returner. The Courier Journal reported, "Paul Mattingly, a Bardstown halfback, was supposed to play second fiddle to big David Johnson. But when Johnson went down with an injury, Mattingly filled his shoes and last Friday enjoyed his best game rushing 18 times for 239 yards and two touchdowns making him the Big 10 Offensive Player of the week." Paul had 20 touchdowns and ran back three punt returns for scores while averaging 30 yards per return. During his career, the Tigers had 38 wins against eight losses. During his freshmen year, the Tigers were

1981 Class AA State Champions.

A defensive specialist in basketball, Paul was normally assigned to guard the best player on the opposing team. A strong scorer, he maintained the highest free throw percentage. Paul was an outstanding track and field athlete. As a junior, he placed second in the All-Mid-Kentucky Conference in long jump and 300m intermediate hurdles. Paul's senior year was outstanding with his Bardstown Invitational triple jump championship as well as the All-Mid KY Conference triple jump champion. In the post season, Paul was regional champion in long and triple jumps; sectional champion in both long and triple jumps. Paul culminated his senior year with Class A State Championships in both the long and triple jumps and was undefeated in his specialty events.

Along his sports journey, Paul received some impressive personal recognition. On the state level for football, Paul was named Honorable Mention for offense in 1983 and 1984, All-Mid Kentucky Conference in 1983 and 1984 and Big 10 Offensive Player of the week after his breakout game of 239 yards. In track and field, Paul was All Mid-Kentucky Conference, First Team All-State for both the long and triple jumps, First Team All-State 4x100m Relay and Second-Team All-State for the 4x400m relay.

After high school, Paul served four years in the army in Schofield, Hawaii. Currently, he is an Engineer Construction Inspector for King County, Washington and proud father of two sons, Paul Jr. and Camden, and proud grandfather to two-year-old Hayden. His favorite memory was an interview with the Courier Journal regarding the game in which he had 239 yards. He finds it an honor and a privilege to be inducted in the Bardstown High School Athletic Hall of Fame. Although he doesn't live in Bardstown, his heart will always remain here.

Rick McKay

Although he only attended Bardstown High School for his junior and senior years, Rick McKay made quite an impression for the Tigers in football, basketball and baseball. Rick was the only starting sophomore quarterback in history at St. Joe Prep and joined the Bardstown sports family after the closure of St. Joe Prep in 1968. Quickly becoming the starting quarterback his junior and senior years, Rick teamed up with his older brother, Phil, in some very exciting athletic ventures. As starting quarterback, Rick produced 151 completions in 306 attempts, 2,552 passing yards, 34 touchdown passes, and 12 rushing touchdowns. His two-year record as starting quarterback was 20-2-2. Rick's total career, including his one year at St. Joe Prep, was 28-4-2.

In 1968, Rick was named a Courier Journal Honorable Mention All-State, All-Mid KY Conference Junior year, and All Mid KY Conference football champions. Additionally, he was a part of the undefeated team that was knocked out of the Class A playoffs in a tie with Frankfort 14-14 - winner determined by number of first downs and total yardage – one point each. Frankfort won 16-14. In 1969, Rick was Co- Captain, Courier Journal 3rd Team All-State Overall, Courier Journal 1st Team All-State Class A, Lexington Herald All-State Team, and Class A State Runner Up with 18 touchdown passes. Ron Greenwell, long time Sports editor for KY Standard said, "The best passing quarterback I've ever seen from Nelson County is still Ricky McKay, and he played for Bardstown High in the late 1960's."

A starter for St. Joe Prep basketball during his sophomore year, Rick was a Tiger team member and letterman during junior and senior years with Bardstown the 19th District Champions both years and 5th Region Champions during Rick's junior year. A two-year starter in baseball, he played third base and pitched. Bardstown was District Champions during his junior year.

An All-State quarterback, Rick signed a scholarship with Centre College. His favorite memory of high school is the help and support provided by Jude Talbott and Coach Martin, an amazing competitor from whom he learned some valuable lessons. Rick, remarked that it would be an honor to make the Hall of Fame along with his brothers. He has been married to his wife Nat for over 30 years and has two sons, J. T. and Newman. He has more than 35 years in various business endeavors. Rick is very proud that his family began the Nelson County Handicap Association (now the Guthrie Opportunity Center), initiated by his mother Nancy G. McKay. Currently, Rick is the CEO of the Guthrie Opportunity Center.

Reginald Mudd

Reginald Mudd 1968-1971

A three-year letterman in football and one-year letterman in track and field, Reginald Mudd found his athletic career at Bardstown booming. At five foot ten inches and 165 pounds, Reginald was a very solid and aggressive guard. During his Tiger career, the Tigers recorded 43 victories against only two losses and earned four district championships, three regional championships, 1967 Class A State Championship, Class A Runner-up in 1969, and 1970 Class A State Championship. As team captain, Reginald was a tremendous force in several crucial games. In Bardstown's 12-6 Frankfort win, Frankfort Coach Raymond Webb said, "Their front four boys shot our gaps and this Reggie Mudd – I tell you, he's tremendous. Every time I looked up he was there. It was a super effort on his part." Coach Garnis Martin added that Reginald was a fine blocker.

Reggie was involved in many important plays including recovering a crucial Fort Knox fumble, breaking through the Washington County defenders and blocking the ball into the end zone where John Prewitt fell on it for six points. In the 1970 state semi-final, he set up the Tigers' winning tally with a midfield fumble recovery late in the opening half resulting in a 7-6 win over Russellville.

Reginald garnered some personal honors for his remarkable performances. He was named First Team Associated Press International All-State Guard, Lexington Herald All-State Team. In addition, Reginald was named Courier Journal First-Team Class A All-state and Third-Team All-State for all football classes. He excelled not only on the football field but also in the classroom where he received the Athletic Scholastic Award.

Reginald took his talents to Centre College playing primarily defensive guard. As varsity letterman, his team won back-to-back College Athletic Conference championships. He received a Distinguished Alumnus award in 2011. Reginald started work for Cracker Barrel in 1982 as a manager trainee and retired in 1997 as Senior VP of Operations/Chief Operations Officer. He, with his wife Mary Anne, are owners of Mudd Properties, an assortment of commercial, industrial, residential and historical buildings in Gallatin, Tennessee. In 2011, he was appointed by Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam to be a Regional Director for Economic and Community Development. He held this position before returning to real estate and property management in 2017.

Reggie has served on many community boards and service projects receiving several community awards. He was named Gallatin Citizen of the Year in 2005 and 2009. Reginald and his wife of thirty-one years are parents to one son, Nicholas. Not a bad resume for an old Bardstown Tiger!

Michael Seaman

Bardstown High with a jump of 15 feet, 4 inches in regional competition. After his second place finish in the 2005 state championship, Michael was undefeated for the remainder of his Tiger career.

The soccer and football teams gained from Michael's athletic talents. Recognized as the best offensive soccer player for three years, Michael was noted as a true competitor on the pitch playing to final horn. Michael held the punting and kicking chores for the football team.

After starting his vaulting career at University of Tennessee, Michael pursued his vaulting career at Samford University. While at Samford, he became a two-time NCAA Division 1 All-American, Samford University record holder, Southern Conference record holder, and three-time US Track and Field Championship Qualifier. In 2011, Samford Coach Rod Tiffin helped coach Michael to his second-consecutive NCAA Championship appearance, earning second team All-America honors. Michael made return trips to the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships in 2012, where he finished sixth and 17th, respectively. For Michael's Samford career, of 50 meets he had 24 (1st); 9 (2nd); 2 (3rd); 2 (4th); 2 (5th); 2 (6th); 1 (7th); 2 (10th); 1 (14th); 2 (16th); 1 (17th); and 4 (NH). Michael finished in the top 10 86 percent and 66 percent time in first or second place. These finishes represented four Southern Conference Championships and one East Regional Championship. In 2014, Michael was accepted into the US Olympic Training Center.

Michael's fond memories of his track and field career include entering and winning random events like high jump or discus to avoid running the 4x400 meter relay team and being on the same team as (maybe) the most future collegiate track and field athletes at Bardstown. Michael lives in Los Angeles and is the CEO of a startup company called SwipeSum.com with his brother, Stephen.
